

## Learning Project WEEK 1: Florence Nightingale

Age Range: KS1

Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Working on <a href="#">Numbots</a> - your child will have an individual login to access this.</li><li>Practise counting in 2s, 5s and 10s (Year 2's also need to practise counting in 3's, choose the duck you want to practise the times table of). This <a href="#">game</a> could support this.</li><li>Practise telling the time on a clock with hands. This could be done through this <a href="#">online resource</a>. Read to the hour, half hour and quarter past (year 1). Year 2 you need to use digital clocks too and read to every 5 minutes past and to.</li><li>Choose and write the name of a 2D shape of your choice. List how many sides and corners it has. Is it symmetrical?</li><li>Try these interactive games about shapes on <a href="#">Top Marks</a>.</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Find a book about a nurse or doctor or someone in the emergency services. Can you read the book to someone?</li><li>Read a poem about a nurse. You can read one about Florence Nightingale online <a href="#">here</a>.</li><li>What stories do you like to read when you are ill? Write a list and read one to someone.</li></ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Daily phonics - your child to practice their sounds and blend words. Interactive games found on link below.</li><li><a href="#">Phonics play</a></li><li><a href="#">Top Marks</a></li><li><a href="#">Spelling shed</a> login</li><li>Spell the numbers one up to twenty</li><li>Spell common exception words</li></ul>	<p>Ask your child to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Write a comic strip about a nurse.</li><li>Create a list of all of the jobs who are part of the emergency services.</li><li>Invent a story involving a nurse. They could write it out or make a story map. Encourage your child to use story language. You could watch '<a href="#">I want to be a nurse</a>' for ideas.</li><li>Create a thank you card for your Doctor's surgery or nearest hospital.</li><li>Write a poem or a prayer about nurses and doctors.</li></ul>
