

The Six Nations

The Six Nations is a rugby union tournament that takes place every year. The 2020 Six Nations will start on 1st February. England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, France and Italy will all play against each other once to see who will win the trophy.

Many people will watch each Six Nations match on television and thousands of people will be watching in the stadiums.



The History of the Six Nations

The Six Nations is the oldest rugby competition in the world. It has been through several formats and name changes over the years.

Year	Name of Tournament	Countries Playing
1883	Home Nations Championship	England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales
1910	Five Nations	England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and France
1932	Home Nations	England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales
1947	Five Nations	England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and France
2000	Six Nations	England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, France and Italy



People think that the game began at Rugby school, England. The story says that, in 1823, while playing a football match, a student called William Webb Ellis picked up the football and ran with it to the goalposts. It's unclear if this story is true. However, it was so popular that the story has become almost a legend in the world of rugby.

All About Rugby

A rugby union team has 15 players on the field and each match lasts for 80 minutes. Substitutes can take the place of other players during the game.

A team can score points in a variety of ways:

- **try** – A try is when a player holding the ball runs across the opposition's tryline and touches the ball down on the ground. This needs to be controlled. A try is worth five points.
- **conversion** – A conversion is worth two points. After a team scores a try, they have a chance to kick a conversion. A player must kick the ball between the goalposts to score a conversion.
- **penalty** – A team receives three points if they score a penalty. The referee gives a penalty when the other team breaks the rules. A player must kick the ball between the goalposts to score a penalty.
- **drop goal** – A drop goal is scored when the ball is dropped to the ground (it has to bounce) and then immediately kicked, manoeuvring the ball between the goal posts and above the cross bar. A drop goal is worth three points.

The Six Nations' Scoring System

The scoring system for the tournament has lots of different possibilities.

A team gets four points if they win. If they score four or more tries, they get a bonus point and this means that they can get five points.

The Six Nations' Scoring System

The team gets zero points if they lose. However, if they score four or more tries or lose by seven points or fewer, they get one point. If the losing team scores four or more tries and loses by seven points or fewer, they get two points.

If the match is a draw, both teams get two points each but can also earn an extra point if they score four or more tries.

If a team wins a grand slam, they get an extra three points. A grand slam is when a team wins all their matches.



2020 Six Nations

After reaching the 2019 Rugby World Cup final, England are the third-best team in the world. However, Wales won the Six Nations in 2019, winning the grand slam. England won the Women's Six Nations last year and they also won the grand slam.

- **try** – A try is when a player holding the ball runs across the opposition's tryline and touches the ball down on the ground. This needs to be controlled. A try is worth five points.
- **conversion** – A conversion is worth two points. After a team scores a try, a team may kick a conversion. A player must kick the ball between the goalposts.
- **penalty** – A team receives three points if they score a penalty. The referee gives a penalty when the other team breaks the rules. A player must kick the ball in-between the goalposts to score a penalty.
- **drop goal** – A drop goal is scored when the ball is dropped to the ground (it has to bounce) and then immediately kicked, manoeuvring the ball between the goal posts and above the cross bar. A drop goal is worth three points.

The Six Nations is an annual international rugby union tournament. Six of the northern hemisphere's top international rugby teams compete in it. They are England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, France and Italy. Over 15 exhilarating matches, the six teams will compete to win this coveted title.

The 2020 Six Nations commences on 1st February and concludes on 15th March. Millions of people around the world will watch the Six Nations matches on television.



The History of the Six Nations

The Six Nations is the oldest rugby competition in the world and has undergone several format and name changes over the years.

Year	Name of Tournament	Countries Playing
1883	Home Nations Championship	England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales
1910	Five Nations	England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and France
1932	Home Nations	England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales

During the tournament, if a home nation (England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales) defeats all the other home nations, they win the triple crown. When England and Scotland play during the tournament, they compete for a trophy called the Calcutta Cup.



It is thought the game of rugby originated at Rugby school, England. Legend has it that it came into existence when a pupil called William Webb Ellis suddenly picked up the football during a match. He then ran with it to the goalpost rather than kicking it. The accuracy of this story has been questioned. However, it is such a popular tale that it has become almost a legend in the world of rugby.

All About Rugby

There are different types of rugby, such as rugby union, rugby league and touch rugby. The Six Nations is a rugby union competition.

A rugby union team consists of 15 players and each match lasts for 80 minutes, with two halves lasting 40 minutes. A team can substitute players during the match. This means that a player who does not start a match can replace another player during the game.

The team that scores the most points wins the game. There are various ways that a team can score points during a game:

- **try** – A try is when a player holding the ball runs across the opposition's tryline and touches the ball down on the ground. This needs to be controlled. A try is worth five points.
- **conversion** – A conversion is worth two points. After a team scores a try, they have an opportunity to kick a conversion. To do this, a player must kick the ball between the goalposts.

- **penalty** – A team receives three points if they score a penalty. The referee gives a penalty to a team if they think the other team has broken the rules. A player must then kick the ball in-between the goalposts to score a penalty.
- **drop goal** – A drop goal is scored when the ball is dropped to the ground (it has to bounce) and then immediately kicked, manoeuvring the ball between the goal posts and above the cross bar. A drop goal is worth three points.

The Six Nations' Scoring System

The scoring system for the tournament has several different possibilities.

A winning team scores four points or if they score four or more tries, five points.

The losing team gets zero points unless they score four or more tries or lose by seven points or fewer, in which case they get one point. If the losing team scores four or more tries and loses by seven points or fewer, they get two points.

They need to apply downward pressure and be in control of the ball. A try is worth five points. A team can also score points by kicking the ball in-between the posts through either a conversion, drop goal or penalty.
