

The True Story of the Three Little Pigs ~ Writing Activities

ALL activities to be handwritten making sure you remember punctuation in particular, your capital letters and full stops and check your spellings. We expect a high standard of presentation – please use a black handwriting pen if you use pen in class or a sharp pencil and write on lined paper.

Over the next few weeks, we are going to be focusing on the story, 'The True Story of the Three Little Pigs'. This story is written from the wolf's perspective of what happened.

You will need to use a thesaurus or an online thesaurus most days to support you to gather a rich bank of vocabulary that you will need to keep each week.

Monday – Repetition

Using the same word or phrase over and over again for effect.

Mind map a list of 6 bad things that the wolf has done, for example, destroyed homes, eaten the pigs.

To build a dramatic ending, using a **repeated phrase as your opener for each sentence** 'If only he hadn't...', write 3 sentences choosing 3 of the wolf's crimes from your list, then a final sentence to summarise if he hadn't committed these crimes he wouldn't be in jail. Use the modelled sentence below to help you.

If only he hadn't eaten the first pig.

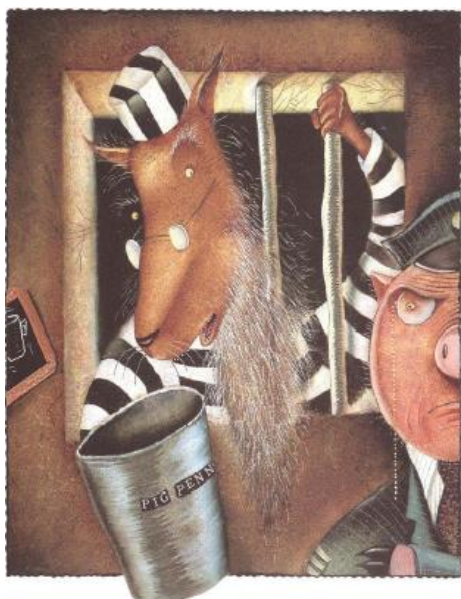
If only he hadn't lost his temper.

If only he hadn't argued with the police. Then he wouldn't be in jail.

Tuesday – Conjunctions

*A conjunction is a word that joins together words, phrases or parts of sentences.
For example, but, and, so, because.*

Look at the picture of the wolf in jail. Write 8 alternative phrases for 'being jailed', for example, imprisoned, caged, denied his freedom.



Mind map 5 ideas of the wolf's feelings about being in jail, for example, unfair, he was framed.

Now write a sentence to describe the wolf's jail and his feelings about it. Use 'although' as a **conjunction** to link your ideas. Use the modelled sentence below to help you.

He was locked up for ten years although he thought he was innocent.

Wednesday – Alliteration

*Alliteration is when words start with the same sound:
For example, Sammy the slippery snake came sliding.*

Mind map 6 **alliterative** phrases to describe the wolf, for example, worried, wicked, wayward, worthless or shameful, scandalous, sinful, sly, slick.

Write two **alliterative** sentences to describe the wolf and include exclamation marks. Use the modelled sentence below to help you.

What a shameful, scandalous slob!

What a wicked, worthless wolf!
